Someone recently sent me a link to an interview that Jackie Pullenger gave while at a conference in Scotland.

Jackie Pullenger is a famous missionary in Hong Kong... and actually she has spoken at St. Mary's, Wollaston many years ago.

The interviewer asked her this question:

*Is there a particular message that's on your heart for Christians at the Christian event she was attending?*

She replied:

*My message is always the same; it's how to get us sure enough of God's love, so we can go out and share it with the lost.*

And the interviewer said,  
*It's as simple as that?*

And Jackie Pullenger replied:

*Well, I don't know about you, but to me it looks quite simple. Having tasted of his love all I wanted to do was share it until I died.*

I just thought it was a great answer.  
It really is that simple.

And I sometimes wonder whether we make it more complicated than it should be.

Jesus in our reading says this:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind."

This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbour as yourself."

Gordon Fee, a respected scholar refers to 'heart, soul and mind' as

"every possible expression of your humanity"

We are to love God with all we are.  
All our desires, our will, our emotions, our thinking... everything.

I'm to love God with all my heart.  
An emotional response needs to find some expression in my love for God.

Using my mind is an expression of love for God.

Scripture says, "God is love."  
We also know that we are made in His image.

So I am at my best when I'm in love.

The very best Adrian Morton you will see is when you see me in love, acting with love.

You and I are designed to be a lover of God with all our being.

1 John says: "We love because he first loved us."

I can only love Him in the measure I receive love from Him.

What costs me is valuable to me.  
What we are willing to sacrifice for shows what is important to us.

It shows our children what is important to us.

We have Black Friday in about a months time.

It always intrigues me when I see on our news screens how people have queued from the early hours.

Sometimes actually people queue all night to get the latest iPhone or games machine whatever it is.....

And then you see the scramble when the shop doors open.  
And one or two leaving the shop with that big screen tv box triumphantly held aloft!

If you are one of those people then bless you.

All I'm saying is that what we are willing to sacrifice for shows what is important to us.

Psalm 84 says "*How lovely is your dwelling place, LORD Almighty! My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the LORD; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God.*"

I think we encounter the love of God in stillness.

The Psalmist says, "Be still and know that I am God."

Busyness works against that.

I heard someone say this week, 'busyness is artificial significance.'

In other words while we can feel significant in proportion to our level of busyness, it is artificial, or counterfeit significance.

And we know that really.

Jesus said unless you abide in me, you can't be fruitful.

Fruitfulness in the kingdom flows from intimacy, from knowing His love.

In that well known Ephesians 3 passage, Paul writes

*I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.*

And whilst this tells us that knowing the love of God goes beyond knowing it in our thinking, important as that is.

So it is about experiencing His love. Taste and see that the Lord is good.

So His love is to be experienced.

This passage also tells us that it is when we are rooted in this love that we have access to the power of God.

Fruitfulness flows from intimacy, from knowing His love.

In my quiet times, I can get overly concerned with whether I'm seeing or discerning things from the Lord.

I can be overly bothered about whether I'm getting new insights from Him.

Rather than sometimes just coming before Him and saying, Lord, I'm just here to be loved by You."

I have no other agenda. I don't need anything else from you.

He then just needs my stillness.

We are designed to have a heart that burns for Him. Not to perform for Him.

To know the wonder of Him, the mystery of Him.

I can know Him but not understand Him.

I think one of the biggest battles we have is in our minds.

A person who can't control their thought life has little ability to love God with the mind.

The battle over the mind is to be clear enough to love God with your intellect.

All distractions that come our way are to keep us from tapping into His heart beat.

So fear, worry, anxiety, what people think of us, am I performing well...

All these things cause me to disengage from my capacity to love Him.

Discovering the Love of God for You starts with surrender.

"Lord, I give myself to you completely."

I need to be aware that it's God in me that makes all things possible.

That makes this tricky business decision possible.

That makes that task or job possible even though I don't feel qualified, skilled or confident enough to do.

I know whenever I encounter God's love, I'm less concerned about whether I'm being a good vicar.

Whether the church is going well or not. Whether I'm achieving enough etc...

Because it's in Him that all things are possible.

It's in Him that I feel significant and worthy. It's in Him I know my future is secure.

We are designed for love, to be loved. We are designed to give away what we receive.

The more impacted by the love of God, then the more our eyes burn with His eyes.

So that when we look into the eyes of another person we have a deep compassion and interest in their well being.

I think Jackie Pullinger had it right. What a great life purpose,

*Having tasted of his love all I wanted to do was share it until I died.*
